

## 911 call on Jan. 11

This is a transcript of the original 911 call on Jan. 11 by Lucile Phillips, 80, of Coquille, which led officers from the Coquille Police Department to the house on East Third Street on Jan. 12, where Carl Foster was working. In the call, Phillips recounts an act of criminal mischief Coquille Police Chief Michael Reaves said was committed by Foster. Phillips' address, phone number and date of birth were removed by The World.

Female dispatcher: Coos Bay Police.

Phillips: Yes, I'm in Coquille.

Dispatcher: mmm hmm.

Phillips: ...police.

Dispatcher: OK, we dispatch for them. What can I do for you?

Phillips: OK, I had a situation with a guy pounding my window — my windshield out.

Dispatch: OK, where were you when this happened?

Phillips: I was on Shelley Road.

Dispatch: OK. I believe I just spoke to ...

(unintelligible)

Phillips: You talked to my daughter. She called ... she called and then she told me I needed to call, too.

Dispatch: OK, well, let me transfer you because this is actually going to be the Sheriff's Office that's going to handle it.

Phillips: (laughing) That's what I thought, I ought to go through the Sheriff's Office for that.

Dispatch: Yeah. Let me transfer you over to them. Hold on.

Phillips: OK.

(tones)

Dispatch: Coos Bay Police.

Phillips: Yes, uh, I ... I just called in and you was going to transfer me to the Sheriff's Office over in Coquille. But it didn't work to transfer me.

Dispatch: OK. Let me try it again. Hold on ma'am.

Second dispatcher: Coos Bay Police Department.

Dispatcher: Hi, Tia, it's Shelia.

Second dispatcher: Hi, Shelia.

Dispatcher: I'm going to transfer a lady that wants to report criminal mischief occurred in the city.

Second dispatcher: OK. Thank you. This is Coos Bay Police Department, may I help you?

Phillips: Oh, I thought I was talking to the Sheriff's Office. (laughing) I don't know who I'm talking to.

Second dispatcher: OK, you were, but they determined that the crime was committed in Coos Bay, so how can I help you?

Phillips: It wasn't — It was committed in Coquille.

Second dispatcher: OK, I dispatch for Coquille too.

Phillips: OK.

Second dispatcher: How — where did it happen?

Phillips: On Shelley Lane.

Second dispatcher: What's the address?

Phillips: What?

Second dispatcher: The address?

Phillips: You know what, I don't — I was in the middle of the road.

Second dispatcher: OK.

Phillips: The guy just got out of his car and was angry at my passenger and took a hammer and pounded my window shield out, because we wouldn't open the door.

Second dispatcher: Oh, really! Did this just occur?

Phillips: Yeah. About 10 o'clock.

Second dispatcher: OK. So — do you know how far up or a cross street or anything on Shelley Road?

Phillips: How far up it is?

Second dispatcher: Yeah, how far up you were when this occurred.

Phillips: You know, I was on - it was before Burnham Street.

Second dispatcher: Is it Shelley Road or Shelley Lane?

Phillips: Shelley Lane.

Second dispatcher: Thank you.

Phillips: It was before Burnham Street.

Second dispatcher: OK.

Phillips: As I was going down the hill.

Second dispatcher: OK, and your last name, ma'am?

Phillips: My name is Phillips, P-H-I-L-L-I-P-S.

Second dispatcher: And your first name?

Phillips: Lucile. L-U-C-I-L-E.

Second dispatcher: Are you Lucile June?

Phillips: What?

Second dispatcher: Are you Lucile June?

Phillips: I can't quite hear you.

Second dispatcher: OK. Do you live at 2700 Shelley Road?

Phillips: Well, it used to be 2700, it's [address] now.

Second dispatcher: [address]?

Phillips: Yeah. But that's my old — they changed the addresses.

Second dispatcher: OK. And Lucile — Mrs. Phillips, what is your phone number there?

Phillips: [phone number].

Second dispatcher: Miss Phillips, I need — I'm starting a report for you, so I need your date of birth.

Phillips: [date of birth].

Second dispatcher: And you said this person just started beating on your windshield? Is that correct?

Phillips: Well, he got out of his (unintelligible) his car went around me, so I couldn't go around and stopped his car, got out and tried to get in the car.

Second dispatcher: Tried to get in your car.

Phillips: We had the car locked and we wouldn't open the door.

Second dispatcher: Uh huh.

Phillips: So he went back to his car and got a hammer and pounded the windshield out.

Second dispatcher: Did he actually break the windshield?

Phillips: It's still in there — it's cracked.

Second dispatcher: It's cracked? OK.

Phillips: Yeah, there are some big cracks in it.

Second dispatcher: Mrs. Phillips, can you describe him?

Phillips: Oh, boy.

Second dispatcher: Was he a white male?

Phillips: Yeah, white man, older man. He's got white — longer white hair, a white mustache, probably in his late-50s. You know (unintelligible).

Second dispatcher: Do you know what kind of vehicle he was in?

Phillips: He was in a — kind of a tan pickup with a... um... oh frame on the outside. He works on construction-type, building. And so they have a place where you can put ladders in and different stuff like that on the truck. Not a cab, you know?

Second dispatcher: Sure, I know what you're talking about.

Phillips: Yeah.

Second dispatcher: Mrs. Phillips, are you at your house now?

Phillips: Yes.

Second dispatcher: I'm going to have a Coquille officer contact you, OK?

Phillips: OK.

Second dispatcher: Are you going to be home for a little while?

Phillips: Yeah.

Second dispatcher: OK, I'll have him contact you.

Phillips: OK.

Second dispatcher: Thank you.

Phillips: OK.

Second dispatcher: Bye-bye.
